**RESOLUTION NO. 2009-26**

**A RESOLUTION OF THE DILLINGHAM CITY COUNCIL DECLARING 1975 INTERNATIONAL BRUSH TRUCK AS SURPLUS EQUIPMENT AND GIVES THE CITY MANAGER THE AUTHORITY TO EXPEDITE THE BID PROCESS.**

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WHEREAS, the City of Dillingham applied for and received a grant from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to replace a 1975 International brush truck ("brush truck") with a 2008 Sterling 7400 International pumper tanker ("pumper tanker"); and

WHEREAS, the new pumper tanker was delivered to Dillingham in the month of October 2008; and

WHEREAS, the FEMA application for the new pumper tanker reported that the vehicle being replaced was unsafe and would have to be removed from service; and

WHEREAS, FEMA has instructed that the unsafe vehicle cannot be used for emergency service, thus it cannot be sold, donated, and or given to another department, but it may be traded in, taken to the junk yard for scrap, taken out of service and donated to a museum, or given to a training academy if the academy is not going to use it for drivers training; and

WHEREAS, in order to assure that an unsafe vehicle is removed from service, FEMA will require the City to transfer title of the vehicle to any individual or organization that is not in the business of providing first-responder services; and

WHEREAS, the City of Dillingham is not eligible for further FEMA grants until the grant for purchasing the new pumper tanker is closed out, which requires the brush truck be disposed of; and

WHEREAS, the Dillingham City Council at their April 27, 2009 Special Council Meeting ruled in favor of offering the brush truck to the public by means of the public bid process in accordance with the Dillingham Code of Ordinance 4.30; and

WHEREAS, the brush truck will be stripped of the pump and emergency lights before it is put out to bid;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Dillingham City Council hereby declares that the 1975 International brush truck should be surplused and gives the City Manager the authority to expedite the public bid process and waive the requirement to publish twice in a newspaper;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the award go to the highest bidder.
